Angkor Wat, Cambodia

The world's largest religious monument and truly one of the modern day wonders. There are direct flights to Siem Reap from Saigon, Phnom Penh, Bangkok, Singapore, Danang and Vientiane.



Krabi, Thailand

Arguably Asia's best stretch of beach. Away from the tourist hordes of Phuket and Koh Samui – idyllic! Daily flights from Bangkok and a range of accommodation options.



Bagan, Burma

An awe-inspiring array of thousands of diverse temples stretching out to the horizon on the sweeping plains of the Irrawaddy River. One of the principal reasons for visiting this fascinating country.



Luang Prabang, Laos

The spiritual capital of the country where numerous temples nestle between the Mekong and Ou Rivers. Fly into Luang Prabang from Bangkok or Vientiane; or arrive by river from northern Thailand.



Bangkok, Thailand

The largest city in South-East Asia has much to offer the visitor from its stunning Grand Palace and many other temples to some fantastic shopping and bustling night markets. The hub of any Indochina trip.



Mekong River, Laos

Travelling on a long tail boat in the north, stopping off at remote H'mong villages on the banks or exploring the many islands in the south by converted rice barge. A wonderful way to really experience the true atmosphere of Laos.



Halong Bay, Vietnam

Over 3000 limestone islands jutting out from the Gulf of Tonkin are best explored by boat. Can be visited as a day trip from Hanoi or you can stay overnight in nearby Haiphong.



Phnom Penh's Royal Palace, Cambodia

Situated amongst the tree lined boulevards and colonial architecture of the capital, the palace is one of the grandest in South-East Asia. Can be combined with a visit to the temples of Angkor.



Hoi An, Vietnam

This 17th century trading port comprises winding streets of old merchants' houses, riverside cafés and craft workshops along with a bustling market. Should not be missed on any trip to Vietnam and can be combined with the ancient capital of Hue.



Rangoon's Shwedagon Pagoda, Burma

The enormous golden dome of the pagoda is a centrepiece of the city and the focal point of Burmese Buddhism. One of the most memorable excursions in the country.
